This presentation offers an in-depth analysis of Isothermal Community College's shift to a predominantly 8-week class format, focusing on the practicalities of this transition across both student services and academic affairs. We will discuss the decision-making process, highlighting the key factors that influenced this pivotal change in our educational model. Special emphasis will be placed on the challenges and strategies involved in modifying institutional culture and operations within both student-facing services and academic departments. This presentation is designed for educators and administrators seeking a comprehensive, professional perspective on implementing and refining a condensed academic schedule for maximum student benefit.

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Increasing the Health Care Workforce Pipeline

Barbara Buchanan, Vice President, Instruction; Alisa Montgomery, Dean, Health & Public Safety, Piedmont Community College

Through partnership with our local hospital and in response to a direct request, Piedmont Community College is responding to local and regional workforce needs by adding a new Practical Nursing program, increasing enrollment in the ADN program, and offering an evening and weekend option for the ADN program on our Caswell campus. We start this cohort in the spring, opposite the fall entry for the traditional program to increase accessibility for non-traditional students. After the initial PN application process and approvals from NCCCS and SACSCOC, the NC Board of Nursing visited our site, learned about the number of applicants, and encouraged us to increase our initial request of 24 seats, to 48. Through strategic planning and seeking of outside funding sources, the College is able to implement the PN program and meet local and regional workforce needs.

	Dual Enrollment Evaluation Partnerships and Findings Emily Smail, Director of Research and Evaluation, NC Community College System Office Over the past four years, NCCCS has participated in an extensive evaluation of Career and College Promise (CCP) programs. This session will cover the nature of the research partnerships and results from the evaluation. The analyses indicate favorable outcomes for participation in any of three CCP pathways. Findings show that participation in a CCP program tends to have similar effects in both genders and both classes of race/ethnicity (i.e., underrepresented and not underrepresented), but stronger effects in students who are economically disadvantaged. Using Healthcare Apprenticeships to Meet Critical Healthcare Needs

Gaston College partnered with CaroMont Health to address healthcare staffing shortages through multiple avenues apprenticeship, new programs, dualenrollment opportunities, scholarships, expansion of simulation, and shared faculty. Foremost among these efforts has been the establishment of multiple healthcare apprenticeships. Currently, Gaston College and CaroMont Health offer healthcare apprenticeship opportunities in nurse aide I and II, phlebotomy, medical assisting, central sterile processing, practical nursing, surgical technology, and licensed practical nursing to associate degree nursing (LPN-to-RN). To date, over 600 diverse students have been enrolled and well-supported in Gaston College programs resulting from the partnership with CaroMont.

Dr. Jeff Cox

Dr. Jeff Cox is the 11th president of the North Carolina Community College System and a lifelong champion of North Carolina public education.

Prior to leading the System, Dr. Cox served as the President of Wilkes Community College from 2014 to 2023 where he more than doubled the completion rate at the college, raised \$20 million for strategic initiatives, and created a five-year strategic plan seen as a national model for other institutions.

Cox formerly served as the Superintendent of Alleghany County Schools from 2005 to 2014. He also has served as Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum & Instruction for Lee County Schools and an elementary principal and assistant principal in Union County Schools. He began his career as a high school teacher and coach.

In 2017, Dr. Cox was awarded an Aspen Institute Presidential Fellowship for Community College Excellence. He was one of 40 college leaders in the country selected for this prestigious program through a rigorous process that considered candidates' abilities to take strategic risks, lead strong teams, cultivate partnerships, and focus on results-oriented improvements for greater student success and access.

In 2001, Dr. Cox earned his Doctoral Degree in Educational Leadership from the University of North Carolina at Charlotte. He also has a Master's in School Administration and a bachelor's degree in English—Secondary Education, both of which he earned from Appalachian State University. Dr. Cox and his wife, Reba, have three sons Dylan, Evan, and Zach and four dogs.



Dr. Robert S. Shackleford, Jr.

Dr. Robert "Bob" Shackelford, Jr. is no stranger to the North Carolina Community College System. Dr. Shackleford served for over 15 years as the President of Randolph Community College, capping a five-decade career as a minister, military chaplain, and educator. During his tenure at Randolph Community College, he was named the North Carolina Community College System President of the Year in 2013 and received the North Carolina Order of the Longleaf Pine in 2022. His varied experiences also saw him assigned to the Pentagon as a military chaplain, where he provided counseling and pastoral care after the September 11, 2001, terrorist attacks on that building.

Dr. Shackleford began his postsecondary education at Bluefield (Va.) College, earning an Associate of Science in Secondary Education. He earned a Bachelor of Science in Physical Education from the School of the Ozarks in Missouri. He completed a Master of Divinity in Biblical Studies and Pastoral Care from Southeaster Baptist

Theological Seminary in Wake Forest, NC, before earning a Master of Science in Child Development and Family Relations and a Ph.D. in Human Development and Family Studies, both from the University of North Carolina-Greensboro.

Since 2022, Dr. Shackleford has been the CEO of the Shackleford Leadership Institute, providing leadership training and executive coaching for colleges, nonprofits, local governments, and other organizations across North Carolina.



Dr. Brian Merritt

Dr. Brian S. Merritt joined the North Carolina Community College System in 2023 as senior vice president and chief academic officer. Before this, he was the president of McDowell Technical Community College (MTCC) from 2021. Under his leadership, MTCC developed a strategic plan with community partners, resulting in significant enrollment growth. He also spearheaded fundraising, securing nearly \$9M in grants and facilitating \$28M in capital projects, including a new off-site center and upgrades to health sciences and public safety facilities.

With a rich background in higher education, Dr. Merritt served as vice president and chief academic officer at Central Carolina Community College (CCCC) for seven years. He also held roles as dean of student learning and grants & alumni relations director at CCCC, raising over \$34 million in grants to enhance student access and success.

A staunch advocate for equitable education solutions, Dr. Merritt hails from Chatham County, NC. He has also contributed to college admissions, alumni affairs, and first-year experiences at institutions like Appalachian State University, Louisburg College, and North Carolina Central University.

Dr. JW Kelley

James "JW" Kelley serves as the associate vice president – student services for the North Carolina Community College System office. He previously served as vice president for student services at Randolph Community College. He began his community college career at Fayetteville Technical Community College as a student services counselor and subsequently progressed through the positions of director of admissions and division chair for humanities/social sciences. His academic experiences include serving as an adjunct instructor at Fayetteville Technical Community College, Webster University, and other institutions. JW holds an Educational Doctorate from Nova Southeastern University, a Master in Arts from Cincinnati Christian University, and a Bachelor in Arts from Johnson University. JW is a veteran of the US Army serving during Just Cause and Desert Storm and was stationed at Ft. Bragg. He is married and they enjoy hiking and running 5k & 10k races. Their two sons currently attend NC

State University. His favorite authors are Malcome Gladwell, JRR Tolkien, CS Lewis, Terry Brooks, and Michael Crichton. He and his family thoroughly enjoy Marvel and DC entertainment.



Dr. Garrett D. Hinshaw

Dr. Garrett D. Hinshaw became the third president of Catawba Valley Community College (CVCC) on August 1, 2006. His journey as a leader started at a young age through athletics and has continued to develop through innovation, calculated risk taking, and a deep passion for helping others to reach their dreams. Under his leadership, CVCC has continued its history of empowering individuals to aspire, dream, and achieve. The College serves as a leading entity in redefining the region's economy through his collaborative efforts to develop partnerships at the local, state, and national levels. He is often quoted for his belief that, "the student is always the most important person on our campus."
